As an Army officer, Loren served as a Field Artillery Battery Commander in Vietnam where he was awarded 2 Bronze Stars and a Purple Heart. He later served as a Battalion Commander in Korea near the demilitarized zoned. In 1980, on his return from Korea, he moved his family to Los Alamos, NM, where Loren designed the primary (atomic bomb portion) of the warhead that flies on the Navy's Trident II Submarine Launched Ballistic Missile. Three years later, the family moved to Germantown, MD, where Loren was assigned to the nuclear weapons safety desk at Department of Energy headquarters. At the end of 1984 Loren retired with 20½ years of Army service.

The family moved back to Los Alamos, NM, where Loren hired on as a nuclear explosive design physicist in the Primary Design Group of the Los Alamos National Laboratory. He later was promoted to Deputy Group Leader of that group.

State University at Albany, and her Master's Degree at Syracuse University.



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# How to charge and maximize life of Lithium Ion batteries

**QUESTION:** How should I properly charge and care for the Lithium Ion (Li-Ion) batteries of my iPod (MP3 Player)/Mobile Phone/Notebook/ Laptop Computer to maximize battery life?

**ANSWER:** The following simple guidelines will help you to improve the life expectancy of your Li-Ion batteries as found in iPods (MP3 Players), Mobile Phones, and Notebook/Laptop Computers.

- 1. Li-Ion batteries do not have what is called "memory" as some other battery technologies do. Li-Ion batteries do not need to be "exercised" to maintain their ability to accept and deliver full charge. Li-Ion batteries prefer frequent recharges rather than deep cycling. To prolong the lifespan of Li-Ion batteries it is advisable to "top up" (recharge) frequently rather than wait for the battery to become fully discharged/drained.
- 2. Avoid elevated temperatures with partial to fully charged Li-Ion batteries. Leaving your iPod (MP3 Player), Mobile Phone, Notebook or Laptop Computer in a location of elevated temperature (for example a car or near a heat source) will adversely affect the lifespan of Li-Ion batteries.
- 3. It is advisable to store Li-Ion batteries (spare batteries only, NOT the device itself) in a sealed plastic bag in a refrigerator at approximately 40% to 50% of full charge. Remember to allow the stored batteries to return to room temperature before you use them (this could take up to 3 hours).
- 4. If possible remove the batteries from your notebook when using the AC Adapter to power your computer, however, make sure that you save your work **frequently** because your data will be lost if there is a power failure or if the AC (Lithium con't in col. 2)

Adapter becomes unplugged when the battery is not in place! Partial to fully charged Li-Ion batteries in a notebook receiving power from an AC Adapter will experience elevated temperatures which will shorten the lifespan of the batteries.

[Please note that Li-Ion batteries do have a limited number of charge cycles available and their performance will deteriorate over time. It is normal to experience between 300 – 500 charge cycles from a Li-Ion battery before it requires replacement.]
